God's Resolution

"For I know the plans I have for you," declares the LORD, "plans to prosper you and not to harm you, plans to give you hope and a future."

~Jeremiah 29:11

Having been part of the Atonement church community for three months I am beginning to see clearly how God uses each of you as a part of the church. There is nothing that brings me more joy than to see you involved in ministry outside and inside Atonement, as you are able. I also believe that God calls us into a future of hope, and that God has plans for our ministry together.

It is my prayer, as your pastor, that we can spend time together listening to God's call for us. As we look to the future with hope we trust that God does indeed have a plan for our life together as our part of the body of Christ. You might call this a time for us to understand 'God's resolution' this New Year. What is God's future for us, and how will the Holy Spirit direct Atonement's unique calling in the world?

It is Pastor Debra's and my hope that each member of the congregation will consider participating in a 'cottage meeting'. A cottage meeting is designed to ask purposeful

questions, to give time for us to think together about our history as a congregation, and to look ahead to the future trusting that the Holy Spirit is actively leading our thoughts and reflections. At each cottage meeting group members will be asked to reflect about what has been important in the history of the congregation—what events, people and times have shaped who this congregation is today? We will then lead a conversation about the future of the congregation—what are your hopes and dreams for your congregation? What do you think God's hopes are for Atonement? How do you see yourself participating in those hopes?

A cottage meeting consists of up to 10 congregation members and congregational friends who will gather in a home to have these conversations. There will be sign-up sheets available at worship during the first part of January for specific dates and times. We believe we can have all of the necessary meetings done by the end of February. Please also consider signing up to host a cottage meeting in your home and providing a light snack. Please sign-up as soon as the sheets are available. Several of the cottage meetings will be 'group specific'. For the

future of our children, youth and family ministry, I am requesting that there be specific cottage meetings for middle and high school families as well as for parents with children birth through fifth grade. The other non-specific meetings will be used as some of the first steps in determining a purpose statement and guiding principles as well as short-term and long-term ministry goals.

I believe this is a very important step in determining the direction our congregation moves in the future. I greatly appreciate and anticipate your participation. I am confident that God's resolution for us is one of hope and great strength.

Let's explore together what this might look like, for each of us has a very important part in the body of Christ.

Multicultural Mosaic Foundation



Join our Turkish friends from the Multicultural Mosaic Foundation, January 18th, as they have extended their hand in friendship with the gift of Ashura / 'Noah's Pudding'. They will be serving this traditional sign of friendship January 18 at church, complete with a 5-minute video about Ashura and its cultural importance.

Ashura is a dessert made from various grains, nuts, and fruits. It is completely vegetarian. The making of ashura is a common practice among Muslim and Christian people in the Middle East (although the dish has different names). The name ashura itself comes from the Hebrew word "Asor" (the tenth). It is traditionally shared with friends and neighbors.

The story of Noah's ark is as sweet as the dessert named for it: When Noah's ark came to rest on Mount Ararat in northeastern Turkey, they felt that a feast of celebration was called for. They hunted through the ark and gathered every little bit of food they could find. This they put into the pudding and made themselves a splendid feast of ashura. Therefore, sharing is in the spirit of ashura—it is the symbol of unity among God's creatures.

Letter to Atonement

(Excerpts)



Thanks to God for sending me to Indonesia. I arrived safely November 17th, 2008 and will, with God's help and the ELCA's support, serve here for two years. I spent my 29th Birthday learning Batak dance, eating cake and singing with the staff and students at the deaconess school where I live. Thanks to all the people who helped me celebrate here and at home. It was one I will never forget. The hospitality and love I have received here in Indonesia are examples of God's love for his creation.

In Indonesia, the Huria Kristen Batak Protestan Deaconesses serve their community throughout the year. This year I joined them as we celebrated the holy season of Advent with gatherings, gifts, visits and meals.

The students at the Pendidikan Diakones School in Balige work in the community as part of a practical requirement by the HKBP church. The students study for three years to become ministers of word and service around the world. The women who become deaconesses are called by God. The students and staff at the school are offering God's concern for the least of these by working with the young, old, imprisoned, and sick. The church here also works with local communities

on issues of gender equality, social justice and environmental protection.

Please pray to God for the ministry of churches around the world. For those who are hungry, pray for rice. And for those who have rice, a hunger for justice.

On Sunday November 23rd, the annual Thanksgiving dinner, sponsored by Atonement and the Native American Connection, served over 500 Native Americans from the Cheyenne Indian Reservation in Eagle Butte, South Dakota.

Church members, friends, neighbors and local businesses donated more than 200 turkeys. Local businesses also donated ingredients for all the trimmings with Boulder Sausage donating over 1600 pounds of sausage. Sixty turkeys were cooked for dinner under the direction of Marion Clifford, Director of the Native American Connections. Marion delivered the food, household items, and clothing. Volunteers helping with the dinner each received a turkey and the rest were given to individual families.

Atonement's Social Ministry leaders gave \$600 from their budget towards the truck rental and gas. Thank you all for helping to feed some of the poorest of the poor in our country.

Holiday Update from Taiwan

Greetings from Taiwan! Here in Taiwan we are in the midst of preparations for Christmas, albeit in a much more subdued way than in the United States. Last Saturday we went to a flower market to pick out a poinsettia to liven up our living room. Taiwan is a major grower of poinsettias, and flower markets here count on huge poinsettia sales to make it through the winter months. Our poinsettia is taking up residence next to our "Christmas bamboo." We bought a small bamboo plant with a festive red and gold ribbon tied around it. So this year all of our Christmas decorations are Taiwanese! At the kindergartens where Elizabeth works all of the kids and teachers are in a rush to put last minute touches on their Christmas programs! Since Christmas is not a national holiday, and winter vacation is during Chinese New Year (end of January), school is active during the weeks of Christmas and New Year's. Therefore, the kindergartens are preparing songs, choreography, and dancing for Christmas shows on December 21st. We are hoping to travel to Taichung to see all of the action.

We also began Chinese language classes recently. Seth attends

class Monday through Friday at National Taiwan Normal University. He has class 15 hours per week and is making rapid progress in speaking, reading, and writing Chinese. He has already mastered writing 32 characters and should be able to write over 200 characters by the end of January. Only 3000 more commonly used characters to go! Elizabeth is attending private tutoring three times per week. Unfortunately, she can't go five times per week because of her teaching schedule. We're having fun teaching each other and beginning to use Chinese in our daily household activities.

In the next couple of months we hope to continue strengthening relationships with the Bishop and clergy in the Diocese of Taiwan. The Taiwanese take an immense amount of pride in their hospitality and generosity, and we have been trying to be gracious in both accepting hospitality and being generous in our time and conversation. We realize many of you will read this after Christmas and the New Year, but we send our Christmas and New Year wishes along anyway. As you continue to pray for our safety and work in Taiwan we will continue to remember all of you in our supporting congregations in our prayers each night. Your support has been incredible and strongly and warmly felt during our time away from home this holiday season.

Something to be glad about:

This year, ONE worked with the U.S. Global Leadership Campaign (USGLC) in their efforts to garner Congressional support for bipartisan letters asking President-elect Obama to make greater investments in diplomacy and development. Today the USGLC announced that a record 217 members of Congress signed on to the letters pledging their support for a robust U.S. International Affairs Budget. This includes 51 Senators and 166 Representatives, including Senator Salazar, Representative (soon to be Senator) Udall, and Representative Ed Perlmutter.

What else can we do?

President-elect Obama will have historic opportunities to bring hope and dignity to millions currently suffering from poverty and preventable diseases, such as malaria and HIV/AIDS. We can make a difference by showing our support for an inaugural affirmation of Obama's pledge to fight poverty and preventable diseases worldwide, and for an FY2010 Presidential budget request that puts the U.S. on track to meet Obama's historic commitments to the world's poorest people.

the ONE Campaign's petition asking the President-elect to spread hope and dignity to those most in need through his inaugural address and Presidential budget. The standard text of this petition is:

Dear President-elect Obama,

In your inaugural address, please make a clear affirmation of your pledge to fight poverty and preventable diseases worldwide, and support that statement with an FY2010 budget request that puts the U.S. on track to meet your historic commitments.

December 11, 2008

Property and Grounds:

The committee submitted a draft for wording contained on the playground dedication plaque installed at the playground:

The final decision about the plate was tabled until the next council meeting. The dedication for the playground is planned for spring 2009.

Concerning other committee issues, multiple facility items had to be fixed in November:

Dishwasher: 800\$
Furnace: 245\$
Parking Lot Light: \$190
Vacuum Cleaner: \$400 (*yet to be purchased*)

Nominating Committee:

Kathy Erickson will be stepping down. Lynette Schulz and Pauline Farrow have not made a final decision if they want to continue. Kathy Erickson agreed to serve on the Nominating Committee.

Endowment Committee:

Pastor Debra and Debra Kelly are working on some information, which will be provided to families who consider donating money to an endowment fund.

Pastor Debra's Report:

On November 21st a group of new members was introduced to the congregation. In last few months families with young children have shown an especially strong interest in Atonement. Children's Church and Music reported some growing numbers of children. The Motto for this year's Advent Season will be: *Expecting The Most.*

To manage the Mission Investments Funds Atonement has with Thrivent Financial

Services, the Treasurer asked the Council to change the existing authorization to the current Council President, Treasurer and Pastor Debra. Motion was made and accepted to accept the proposal.

Budget Outlook for next

year: To cover the increased expenses and to balance the 2009 budget Atonement has to save about \$2500 every month and needs about \$3500/week extra giving.

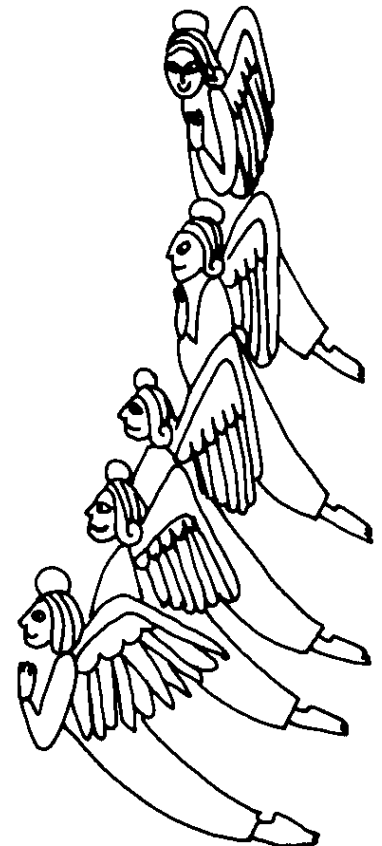
